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Settlements in the construction industry so far in 2014, analyzed by the Construction Labor Research Council (CLRC), averaged the following: first year—2.2 percent (\$1.10), second year—2.5 percent (\$1.23), and third year—2.5 percent (\$1.28). Statistics listed as "2014-June" in this report reflect wage and fringe benefits combined from January through June 2014. Exhibits 1 and 2 show the 7-year trend.

First year settlements, shown as percents





Exhibit 2

Increases to date in 2014, both as percents and dollar amounts, were very similar to 2013 and slightly higher than increases in 2012, as shown in **Exhibit 3**.


NOTE: It is still early in the year, so these findings should be viewed as preliminary. As CLRC collects additional data throughout the year, the final results for 2014 could be different from what is shown in this report. CLRC will publish additional *Settlements Reports* in September and December of 2014.



The median increases from January through June 2014 were generally lower than the averages outlined earlier, at 1.9 percent (\$1.01) for the first year, 2.4 percent (\$1.15) for the second year, and 2.5 percent (\$1.24) for the third year. The median is the rate at which half of the agreements are higher and half are lower and is less affected by outliers.

**Exhibits 4 and 5** show details about the first year of collectively bargained settlements. The most common settlement so far in 2014 was 2.6 - 3.0 percent. In 2012 and 2013 the most common settlement was lower, 2.1 - 2.5 percent. There was the same percent of settlements with no increase through June 2014 as 2012, but more than during 2013.



**Exhibit 5** shows that there was a bimodal distribution of increases for 2014-June based on dollar amount. In other words, both the \$0.61-\$0.80 and \$1.21-\$1.40 ranges were the most common.

### Settlements by Region

Average first year settlements for 2014-June ranged from a low of 2.0 percent in the West North Central region (median = 2.0 percent) to a high of 2.8 percent (median = 2.1 percent) in the South Central region, as shown in **Exhibit 6**. **Exhibit 7** shows the regions with the dollar amount of their agreements. The lowest average occurred in the South Central region at \$0.84 (median = \$1.15) and the highest average was the East North Central region at \$1.16 (median = \$1.20).

It is interesting to note that the region with the largest increase expressed as a percent, South Central, also had the smallest increase expressed in dollars. This is because the South Central region has some of the lowest rates, and a relatively small increase in dollars and cents turns out to be a relatively large increase when the percent is calculated.

#### **Settlements by Craft**

Average first year settlements for 2014-June ranged from a low of 1.5 percent (median = 1.6 percent) for Painters to a high of 4.2 percent for Operating Engineers (median = 3.1 percent), as shown in Exhibit 8. When the average is substantially higher than the median, as is the case here with the Operating Engineers, that means there was a small number of settlements far above the others (i.e., high outlier).




#### **Contract Length**

From 2008 to 2011 there was a definite trend toward shortening the number of years in contract settlements. To illustrate, in 2008, 39 percent of the contracts were for one year and by 2011, 68 percent were for one year, nearly a 30 percent increase in just three years. Conversely, the percent of three year or longer terms went from 52 percent to 23 percent during this same time.

However, beginning in 2012 this trend stopped, with the percent of agreements for one year declining to just over 60 percent in 2012 and 2013, and then falling to 42 percent by 2014-June, as shown in **Exhibit 10**. Additionally, the percent of settlements with terms that are three years or more increased to 48 percent so far in 2014.
